Comments from the President

Comments from the January 12, 2025 Vestry meeting.

The President thanked all members for their willingness to serve St. Matthews and welcomed James Greening as our new Vice President.



Main topic of the meeting was to establish the Activity Calendar for 2025. The President presented a draft which was reviewed and some minor changes were made. A copy of the Activity Calendar will be in the 2025 Church Director which will be available in the near future.

The Treasurer's report provided balances of all the Church's accounts as of 12/31/24. In addition, the balances in all the memorials and designated funds were provided. The funds that we continue to collect for are: Ukraine Relief, Seminary Adopt-A-Student, LCMS Disaster Relief, and the Ethiopian Pastor.

Church Properties reported that the Ladies restroom by the nursery is begin remodeled and members should not enter it. The other restroom by the nursery is currently available.

Pastor Reagan reported on his activity in December. In addition, he announced that Confirmation Graduation will be held on March 2nd and as a result there will be no Sunday School on that Sunday. Pastor and Rebecca thanked the congregation for the generous gift they received on Christmas Eve.

Under New Business it was announced that a picture of our current Adopt-A-Student, Jonathan Pietrowski and his family, along with a newsletter from Ebenezer Ethiopian Lutheran Church in Columbus, is posted on the board in the Fellowship Hall. A copy is also included in this Newsletter.

It was also announced that EJ and Madelyn Berger will attend the Ohio District Junior High Gathering at Camp Christian in Marysville in March. Kary Ellen will also attend as an adult chaperone which is required. When they return EJ and Madelyn will give a presentation to Vestry on their experiences at the camp.

February 2nd - Vestry meeting at 11:00 a.m. February 5th is our Valentine's Day dinner at TJ Chumps in Huber Heights at 6:00 p.m. This is open to everyone to attend. Miscellaneous:

Some members have asked if we are collecting funds for the wildfire disaster in California. Below is an article from the District Connection that addresses this.

"Many of you are likely wondering how you can best help the victims of these terrible fires. Our eagerness to serve and help those affected is part of loving our neighbor. It's important, however, to give the "right" help as expressed by victims, not what we may assume they need.

Emergency Network Los Angeles (<u>enla.org</u>) has recently reported to us that they are seeing donation centers being overwhelmed and people "self-deploying" to disaster areas. While

intentions are good, the results are not. Thank you for your willingness to give and serve, and also for your patience as the needs will emerge and evolve over the coming days, weeks, months, and even years - and your help will be needed over the long-term.

- Pray Continue to lift up the victims, first responders, communities and all of us in prayer
 as we experience this significant disaster. This includes praying that we recognize the
 opportunities we have to share the light and love of Jesus to so many in need. See
 below for a prayer you can offer. Especially be in prayer as another significant wind
 event is expected through Wednesday 1/15.
- Donate Victims will have a significant immediate need for financial resources to purchase basic items, pay for hotel stays, pay for meals, etc. The PSD has a standing fund which you can donate funds to for this purpose (see below). We have already distributed about \$4000 in gift cards to area congregations, and will continue to do so thank you to so many who have contributed. A generous donor has offered a donation challenge to our subscribers, matching your donations up to \$10,000. Please donate if you can."

Until further notice our Disaster Relief funds will go to the Pacific Southwest District – LCMS to support the congregations, schools, and individuals who have been affected by the fires. Thanks in advance for your support.

The Waste

Humans are a waste – yes we are. We waste precious air on pointless conversations and plastic packaging. We waste wishful water on whimsical drinks and withering skin. We waste formed earth on forced fortunes and foundations for farces. Wasting parts of Truth on so-called philosophies, childish wallows, common fakes. We waste pure thoughts on perilous violence and perverted perspectives. We waste warranted bodies on warring wardens and wandering waists. We waste forged emotions on fictitious fads and faithless familiarities. Wasting parts of Soul on so-called religions, clever wishes, cinched freedoms. All for what? A simple, eternal, pathetic thought.

True Love

Many of us celebrate Valentine's Day in both fun and serious ways. Children exchange treats and humorous cards with classmates and friends; some bring home handmade cards for the adults in their lives. Romantic partners may go out to eat and present each other flowers, chocolate, a fancy card — maybe even an engagement ring!

Yet, here, I sit, And still want to have sought.

As playful as Valentine's Day can be, it's also a great time to remember the serious side of love, as indicated by these quotes:

- "When you love someone, you love the whole person as he or she is, and not as you would like them to be." —Leo Tolstoy
- "You don't love someone because they're perfect; you love them in spite of the fact that they're not." —Jodi Picoult
- "Love ... is quiet understanding, mutual confidence, sharing and forgiving. ... It settles for less than perfection and makes allowances for human weaknesses." —Ann Landers

We can do the difficult work of true love — actions, not just feelings — only because God loved us first. He did (and does) so despite our imperfection, and in Jesus, God shows us how to share true love with others. This Valentine's Day, if you don't remember any other profound quotes, hold this one in your heart:

• "We love because God first loved us." —1 John 4:19 (NCV)

Leave it to God

Fourth-century theologian Augustine urged again and again that we focus on practicing love in the here and now, not on worrying about our lives in the hereafter.

In Beautiful Bodies, Margaret Miles writes that especially regarding complicated doctrines like predestination and challenges like "The one who endures to the end will be saved" (Matthew 24:13), we can't do anything but leave those to God. It's impossible for humans to take responsibility for ourselves in such matters. If we could determine our afterlife destiny by means of effort, persuasion or bribery, self-pride would surely be the accompanying sinful result.

"In fact," Miles writes, "preoccupation with one's eternal destiny distracts from a Christian's present business. 'Leave it to God,' St. Augustine said, and place your attention on living lovingly in the body of Christ here and now."
