#### **Preparation for Worship**

Our worship service actually begins each Sunday with the Prelude. Google defines a prelude as "an action or event serving as an introduction to something more important." What follows, of course, is the worship of the living God, where He comes to us with His gifts of Word and Sacrament.

The prelude is not just background music to settle in—it is the beginning of worship. It is a time for us to sit quietly, meditatively, and prayerfully, preparing our hearts and minds to receive all that God desires to give.

Likewise, our service ends with the Postlude. As the dictionaries remind us, a postlude is "something that comes after and serves as a conclusion to what came before." This, too, is a sacred moment. While the postlude plays, we can pause to reflect on what we have heard and received in worship, and offer thanksgiving to God for His abundant mercy in Christ.

So take these opening and closing moments each week as holy opportunities:

- During the \*\*Prelude\*\*, reflect on the gracious gifts you are about to receive.
- During the \*\*Postlude\*\*, rejoice with gratitude for all that God has done for you in Christ.

Both are God-given times for prayer, meditation, and thanksgiving—bookends of grace that help us carry worship into daily life.

#### **Christian Symbol**



CIRCLE — The circle is a symbol for God, as well as for eternity, due to its lack of a beginning or an end. It also reminds us of how the church year (not unlike the secular calendar) flows from season to season and moves smoothly from Christ the King Sunday (the culmination of the liturgical calendar) to the First Sunday of Advent (a new beginning). Indeed, the One who rules all is the same One whose first and final comings we anticipate anew during Advent.

#### Remembering the Saints

When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter "To all God's beloved ... who are called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.



The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God's beloved — special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are "called to be saints."

About 700 years after the church began, leaders designated November 1 as All Saints' Day to honor people whose lives reflect Christ dwelling within them. Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.

#### A Day to Honor Our Veterans



On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection — a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).
